## Tornado Outbreak Wreaks Havoc on Area: What Can You Do?

It seems that disasters mostly seem to happen far away, making us feel remote and helpless even when we want to help. But sometimes, disasters happen close to us—or maybe even to us. That was the case recently when tornadoes spawned by thunderstorms stuck the nearby communities of Canton, Eustace, and Emory, causing massive damage and killing four people.

That list of tornado-affected areas was expanded when the National Weather Service added an area near Cumby in Hopkins County, bringing the tornado outbreak on April 29 to seven. The tornado south of Cumby was small, judged to be an EF-0 tornado, much smaller than the deadly EF-4 tornado that devastated Canton.

It caused little damage, certainly less than the other areas touched that night. But all of the tornados, so close to Commerce, give us pause to reflect on what we would do if the damage was here. It is gratifying to see the many government agencies, civic and community organizations, and numerous individuals who immediately responded to aid those affected by the storms.

Initially, the desire of many who wanted to help was to rush in right away. But that was discouraged before the initial assessment of damage was completed. Instead monetary donations were emphasized to the Red Cross and other groups which were quickly organized to help.

## Items for Hygiene Kits Now Being Collected

Presbyterian Disaster Relief has made it easy for churches to help those in need following disasters by creating four "disaster kits" that help meet different needs. In a church wide effort, FPC would like to collect the items in one of those kits—the Hygiene Kit—so that the congregation can put those kits together as part of our July 11 worship service. Rev. Rasco plans to take the completed kits to the Van Zandt Fairgrounds to the Volunteer Reception area there for distribution to those in need.

Kit items are arriving and being stored until the July 11 service. The items for the kit are:

One each of the following: hand towel (approx. 16" x 28" (no finger tip or bath towels; wash cloth, wide-tooth comb, nail clipper, bath size bar of soap (in original packaging); toothbrush (in orginal packaging).

And six BandAids or other adhesive bandage strips.

(Seal all items in a one-gallon plastic bag with zipper closure.

Please do not add toothpaste. Toothpaste with an extended expiration date wil be added to the Hygiene Kit shipments just prior to their departure.

**FPC Treasurer's Report**

#### March

Our budget for 2017 is \$11,729 of operating expense per month. March receipts were \$12,870.33, including \$2,512 fund-raised for the flooring project. Not counting those donations, regular receipts were \$10,358.33 which is 12% lower than the budget. Expenses were \$10,961.64. These expenses were 6.5% lower than the budget. Including the special funds our bank balance increased by \$1908.79 in March.

#### April

In April, our receipts were \$14, 373.99 which is 23% over budget. Donations included 2 large non-recurring deposits. Expenses for the month were \$14,004,49. Included in those expenses was a \$2,200 down payment for the flooring project. Another unusual expense was the removal of a dead tree from the church grounds. April's net activity increased our bank balance by \$369.50.
