

But Presbyterian Women, here and across the country, do so much more than help with food. As the two posters shown here (which are meant to go together) demonstrate so well, there are missions and causes that Presbyterian Women stand up for and support, locally and abroad, with their time and resources.

A recent mission effort of the PW Circle, but which was supported by the entire church was Sole Hope, which sends locally made shoe parts to fabricators who will send completed shoes to those who need them in Africa.

And that's just the "tip of the iceburg." So the next time you hear an incomplete description of what Presbyterian Women are, don't hesitate to toot the horn of Presbyterian Women everywhere.

FPC's **Isabel Davis** issued a "Thank you" to everyone who was able to attend the Commerce Food Pantry's orientation and training on June 25.

"We had a good group and had lots of good input and ideas," she said.

If you are a volunteer or want to volunteer to help the food pantry and you were not able to attend, please check in with Isabel or **Angela Roberts** so that you get a packet of information and make arrangements for the required Civil Rights training.

Currently, the food pantry is using **SignUpGenius**, an on-line tool, to schedule volunteers. If you would like to volunteer and feel uncomfortable going on line, you can contact Isabel or Angela and they will help put you to work with a schedule that meets your needs.

For the month of July, three volunteers will be used to sign in neighbors who need food assistance. In addition, each week two people are needed to put the food in sacks, along with one to help take these bags to vehicles as needed.

"We also use one person who acts as pantry manager for the day," Isabel explained. "That means that they oversee the "free" table, bread distribution, produce distribution, and tally the days service as well as make the Brookshire's food order the following week. It takes about 20-30 minutes after we close at 4 p.m. to put things away and lock up the building. It is most helpful when volunteers can stay after 4 to help. To run smoothly, 6 volunteers are needed each Thursday."

Other opportunities include stocking the pantry on Wednesday morning at 8:15 a.m., periodically picking up produce from Cooper or Wolfe City on Thursday morning, and helping to receive shipments to the pantry from the North Texas Food Bank on the first, third, and fifth, Wednesdays.

Saturday from 6 p.m. until 9 p.m. If it hasn't been filled yet, there may be a need for help to (1) set up at 5:30, (2) man the table for an hour, (3) help pack up the donations of food and deliver them to the food pantry, or (4) take down the table and canopy. Don't Forget Food Pantry Items

The Commerce Food Pantry serves between 30-45 different families in need each week—over 150 families each month. As a new member of the North Texas Food Bank, the Commerce Food Pantry has greatly expanded its ability to serve food to those in need. Donations, however, remain an important source of its ability to help people. Remember to help out the food pantry with a donation of food each Sunday.

1st Sunday—Peanut butter

2nd Sunday—Bag of pinto beans and/or rice
3rd Sunday—Can of chili or beef stew
4th Sunday—Cans of tuna, spam, chicken
5th Sunday—Cans of fruit: peaches, fruit cocktail

Thoughts about Mission: Helping Older Adults

Michele Hendrix, 65, has experienced almost dying while still relatively young. She thinks it has given her insight in her job as president of the Presbyterian Older Adult Ministry Network (POAMN).

She recently spoke at the seventh International Conference on Aging and Spirituality at Chicago's Concordia University. A Presbyterian News Service story about her says she "argues passionately for the church to come up with a compassionate response to challenges facing aging populations, their families and society."

"I talked about how older adults are going through so many losses," Hendrix said in the article, "Including the loss of their church. When they can no longer walk inside its walls, they feel disposable

The article points out that by 2030, this country's "estimated 72.8 million adults — 20 percent of U.S. residents — will be 65 or older," an age group that most PC(USA members fall into.
