A Message From the Pastor


Dear FPCC and Friends,

I have noticed that the topic of authenticity has come up a lot lately. I believe that people, especially the younger generations, are craving more authentic encounters and more



authenticity from one another and from leaders. Not that long ago there were a lot of subjects that were taboo including religion/faith, sexuality, and mental health, among many others. In many ways, these topics are still taboo. I imagine they were and are taboo because it requires a person to be vulnerable. To talk about such personal subjects means that you have to risk rejection, and lack of understanding on the other's part.

Vulnerability is hard and scary because you have no idea how the other person is going to react. Yet, trying to be authentic and opening myself up to my own pain and being able to share with others has actually had the opposite results. It has allowed others a safe space to say "me too." It allows for people to let down their facades and say "I make mistakes and I am not what society would deem perfect, but that's ok because I'm not alone." No one out there is perfect, and the more we open ourselves up and are truthful with others, it dismantles this idea of being perfect which takes a lot more energy to uphold. I realize there a lot of times that I do try to portray myself as if everything is going well and perfect. I will keep trying. In the mean time, I wonder if the church as a whole could be included in trying to be more authentic and vulnerable and what would that look like? Would it include more testimonies, personal or communal confessions? Maybe it would be just as simple as sitting next



The photo was sent with the following sage notation, "Now that Rose, Paul, and their little son Austin are living with us for a bit, our farm animals have decided to take Austin on as a project. They are continually monitoring him to make sure he's safe. This innate understanding they have of Austin's vulnerability shows God's will that we all care for each



OUT OF CHAOS, HOPE...for victims of Hurricane Florence

God is our refuge and strength

Therefore, we will not fear ... though the waters roar and foam, though the mountains tremble. — Psalm 46

Do you want to help those people devasted by Hurricane Florence, but don't know where to start. One way is to support the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) effort. PDA is delivering immediate aid to those impacted by the storm on the Eastern Seaboard of the United States. PDA is deploying teams to affected presbyteries to meet with Presbyterian and community leadership to assist in coordinating relief efforts and mucking out homes and churches. After initial needs are addressed, PDA will remain — providing spiritual and emotional care and long-term recovery to address the unmet needs of those impacted.

Here is what Presbyterian Disaster Assistance suggests:

<u>Give</u>: Financial support for relief efforts can be designated to DR000169, which supports the church's response to hurricanes impacting the U.S. Gifts can be made <u>online</u>, by phone at (800) 872-3283, or by check, which can be mailed to Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), P.O. Box 643700, Pittsburgh, PA 15264-3700.

Act: Learn how you and your congregation can help families who have lost everything in the devastation. Stay informed and <u>like us</u> on Facebook, <u>download resources</u> and share updates with your congregation.

Pray: In these days of relief, assessment and response, open our eyes, our hearts and our hands to the needs of your children and the movements of your Spirit, who flows in us like the river whose streams make glad the city of God, and the hearts of all who dwell in it, and in You.

We have a God who displayed massive amounts of vulnerability. We have a God who turns weaknesses into strength, who turns mourning into dancing, and who turns death into life. We have a God who has been there, done that, understands and will not reject us. If we could trust in that knowledge a little more, maybe we too can find strength in our weaknesses, dancing after mourning, and new life where there once was death.
