Information on the 2016 PW Thank Offering

Presbyterian women have been making grants to creative ministries through the **Thank Offering** since 1888. During this time Presbyterian women have granted support to thousands of ministries worldwide, and raised millions of dollars for mission. In 2015, the Thank Offering supported 22 projects chosen for grants totaling \$510,088. Fourteen of the projects are ministries that serve people in the U.S. Eight of the projects are international. More than 40 percent of the funded projects are health ministries.

Listed below are two of the fourteen USA ministries that will receive grant money in 2016:

• National: Synod of the Covenant: "Family to Family Furniture Bank" – Bed Project, Marysville, Ohio

This project will help families who face hardship or emergency situations receive furniture, including beds, to help them return to independent lives.

• National: Synod of Lakes and Prairies: "Exploit No More" – RISE Restoration Center, Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

"Exploit No More" is a Christian organization dedicated to ending child sex trafficking in the Greater Milwaukee area.

There are 12 more national projects receiving grants and 8 international projects receiving grants including one sponsored by a church in Grace Presbytery: First of Fort Worth, which is listed here.

• "Living Water International"

This grant will be used to purchase a drill rig for use in Haiti, where at least 36 percent of the population lacks access to safe water. Living Water International (LWI) is the implementing partner for this project. The resident LWI team leader will train and work with local Haitians to drill in communities that have requested a well.

PC(USA) Stated Clerk to Lead Live-streamed Reformation Worship Service on Nov. 2

"Write the Vision—Reclaim the Call" is the theme of a church-wide Reformation worship service being led by the **Reverend Dr. J. Herbert Nelson, II,** on Nov. 2 at the Presbyterian Center and live-streamed to the public.

"This is an opportunity in this Reformation season to call for a reform within the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A)," said Nelson, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly. "It is my hope that we, as a denomination, can embrace a spiritual reformation that breaks down the walls that separate us within the national church and those that divide us from the communities where God has placed us."

Worship will begin at 10:45 a.m. (Eastern Time) and can be viewed live at <u>oga.pcusa.org</u>. A video of the service also will be posted for later viewing.

The service coincides with Reformation Sunday, which is Oct. 30. Also significant is the fact that 2017 marks the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation, which is being celebrated in various ways and across denominations.

Nelson will draw from scriptures in Habakkuk and Luke as he calls the church to proclaim a new vision through prayer, reconciliation, and recommitment to Jesus Christ. The Sacrament of Holy Communion will be served during the worship service. Congregations are encouraged to consider meeting in a common space to view the worship service and discuss possibilities for the future of their ministries. The worship service will be held in the chapel of the PC (USA) national headquarters (100 Witherspoon Street, Louisville, Kentucky).

The liturgy will be available at <u>oga.pcusa.org</u> for viewing or download.

The **Commerce Food Pantry** and FPC's **Isabel Davis** made news recently when The East Texan, TAMUC's student newspaper, published a nice story published Oct. 13 about the good being done by the food pantry.

Among the facts Isabel related about the food pantry was a non-fact, rather, a dream that is slowing being pursued. It is the pantry's long term goal for a new location that would allow the food pantry to better serve its clients.

"We would be able to serve the people better

with more space and be able to have refrigerators and freezer to keep perishable food," Isabell said. "Right now, we're limited to canned and nonperishable items except once a month we've been getting fresh produce from FISH in Greenville, but we have to pick it up and dispense it all in the same day. That limits the amount we can give out and limits the amount of families that can benefit from that."
