## Take a Self-Guided Labyrinth Tour at FPC

What are those lights glowing in the back yard of FPC. They are an Advent Labyrinth, a symbol of our journey to Christmas. It

was constructed **Rick Selvaggi** and Krista and Jason Rasco and officially launched with a ceremony on Nov. 30. It will be lit each evening from 5:30 to 10 p.m. through Christmas.

Our labyrinth is a symbol, first of the journey of Joseph and Mary from Nazareth to Bethlehem. But it is also a symbol of the spiritual journey each of us makes, especially at this time of year. It is a tool to provide an intentional time to draw close to God.

If you didn't make the kickoff ceremony, that's okay. Here's what to do to participate in the FPC Advent Labyrinth.

Simply follow the path to the center. There are no dead ends, like a maze. As you journey, it can start with the contemplation of Mary and Joseph as they trusted in God to guide them. It may lead you

in other directions, including reflection on the path you find yourself on.

There is no right or wrong way to experience the labyrinth. You can walk the labyrinth without words, or you can sing, pray, or read scripture. Begin, however, by taking a few moments to reflect and prepare yourself. The idea is to open yourself to God's presence. Journey with an open heart and mind!
