A Message From the Pastor

Sometimes a new or different perspective may be called for. Day to day living can cause us to make routines. Routines can be beneficial and good, but they can also leave us stuck doing the same thing over again, or even cause us to miss seeing something new that can be as valuable as “the way we have always done things”.


That is just what the session has tried to do the last two years, by having their elder training events outside of the walls of the church building. Last month, four of our elders attended an Elder Training Event at Camp Gilmont. Retired Stated Clerk of PC(USA), Gradye Parsons, lead the retreat.

Rev. Parsons gave the pastors and ruling elders at the retreat space to reflect on the church and its mission in a little different way. He asked us to think of each person in the church, to imagine where they sit on Sunday morning, and then think of the spiritual assets each individual gives to the church. He mentioned assets such as “spiritual insight; encouragement; practical help; life wisdom; and simply being an example—of someone who has overcome struggles to keep the faith; someone who makes your burdens seem lighter, or who nurtures children or mentors teens, or who cares for older people.”

So that is just what these four elders and I did. We ended up with a large list of assets this church has, even though we didn't have time to “assess” everyone or consider such things as physical resources (our time, our money, our beautiful building and its contents).

Prestigious Opera Program Accepts Micah

First Presbyterian worship service attendees on Jan. 29 got an expected, and very nice, announcement from **Micah Krajca**, a TAMU-C student who is in his third year of singing in our choir. He has been accepted into a very prestigious summer program for young artists called The College Light Opera Company in Falmouth, Massachusetts, on beautiful Cape Cod.



Founded in 1969, CLOC strives to provide high-quality musicals and operettas to summer audiences on Cape Cod, while at the same time giving young talent from around the world a chance to begin a career in music theatre. This independent, not-for-profit, educational theatre provides a community where young artists have the opportunity to practice and perfect their art in a supportive and nurturing environment.

Micah said he came across The College Light Opera Company on-line using an app. He applied and was accepted, which is an honor because CLOC's company is selected annually from applicants across the country and around the world. A description of the company taken from its website, says it consists of "32 talented singers, an 18-piece orchestra, 12 dedicated technicians, two box office representatives, two accompanists, two associate conductors, a choreographer, a stage manager, a cop work director, a chef, a business manager, a marketing director and a bullpen of professional directors and conductors."

Each member will spend the summer working in a professional atmosphere free of other academic responsibilities—with the goal of refining their craft.

"I was attracted to this company because I

longed for an *opportunity* to practice and perfect my art in a supportive and nurturing environment," Micah said. "I am incredibly excited, but I can also say that I am equally as nervous."

It will be a big challenge, in part that is because of the rigor of the schedule, but also in part because Micah said this will be "the first time that I will be in a place where I will not have any friends or family beside me."

"I decided to take on this challenge to prove to myself that I am capable," he said.

Everyone who knows him at FPC can certainly predict only success for him.

His summer in Maine—from June 9 until Aug. 27—will certainly be almost non-stop.

"We will perform nine operettas/musicals, Micah explained. "When we get there we will receive an audition binder for the summer. The first audition will be on June 14 for the first three shows of the season. The rest of the auditions will occur throughout the summer.

"We will be coached before each audition. This will be quite the learning process since I am more familiar with the education world. These shows include *The Zoo* and *Trial By Jury*, *Patience*, *Anything Goes*, *Cabaret*, *Grand Hotel*, *My Fair Lady*, *Pippin*, and *The Desert Song*."

Micah provided a glimpse of what he will be doing. As part of weekly rehearsals, he will receive vocal and dance training each week. While one show is being performed, the following week's show is being rehearsed during the day. His average day will begin at 10 a.m. with a break for lunch at 12:30 and then continues from 2-5:30 p.m.--with a performance in the evening. There are five evening performances, Tuesday through Saturday, and a matinee performance on Thursday. A technical rehearsal takes place on Sunday evening and a dress rehearsal on Monday evening."

Performances are in the historic Highfield Theatre in Falmouth, and are frequently sold out.

"We will be staying in an old resort complex in West Falmouth and it is about four miles from the theatre," he said. "Meals will be served in the dining room. In addition to the shows, we will have small work assignments to help with the food and cleaning process."


