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Lent Has Begnn: Where Will You Let Jts Journey Take You?

Lent is not just a liturgical season in the church year—or a time to "give something up" for our faith. It is our personal emulation of the journey to the Cross that Jesus traveled. After his baptism, Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness eating nothing. He wasn't on the mother of all weight loss programs, he was fulfilling prophecy as an example to his disciples (and to us today).

He was sorely tempted by the devil, but did not yield to temptation, and emerged from the wilderness to complete his arduous journey unto death. But his death was not the end. God's plan was fulfilled and Jesus was resurrected from the grave.

Just like Jesus, we are all tempted to journey off the path to the Cross. Few of us can deny we enjoy comfort, privilege, and power. The temptation comes when we place too much importance on those things or put them in the wrong order to benefit ourselves at the expense of our fellow travelers.

The promise of Lent can be fulfilled, but not by simply accepting that we will be tempted and knowing God will save us for our faith in Jesus when we fail. It is fulfilled when we actively fight our temptations, knowing that God will save us because we have faith in Jesus and, <u>because of that faith</u>, choose good and right over expedience and self, even when we fail.

God expects us to fight the good fight and he gave us his son as a shining beacon to light our way to the finish.

Hurricane Response Update

from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance

Greetings in the Light,

This past fall, three hurricanes battered parts of the Caribbean and Gulf Coast regions. Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria brought violent winds and severe flooding, and their rapid succession left many people and relief organizations overwhelmed. Your faithful and generous support, however, allowed the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to respond with the light of hope in the midst of chaos, through the work of Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA). **Thank you for your support.**

Your gifts provided emergency funding in Texas, Florida, Cuba and Puerto Rico. In the days after each storm, PDA was on the ground, assessing damage, providing expert support, partnership, consultation and coordination. Impacted congregations received urgent assistance to continue in ministry to their affected neighbors. PDA's response is widening, providing resources for long-term recovery, working with partners to set up volunteer rebuilding opportunities, supporting capacity building and providing support and training for leaders in Compassion Fatigue and Resiliency. Fatigue and hopelessness often cause a second crisis long after the winds subside and the waters recede.

Historic support from Presbyterians ensured a swift response. In Florida, decades of work in partnership and capacity building with the Florida

PDA Network (FLAPDAN) meant that preparation and coordination began before Irma made landfall. Collaboration with presbyteries in Texas provides coordination of disaster response efforts. Ongoing support from Presbyterians means that long-term redevelopment is accomplished as the love of Christ is made visible in all of the affected areas.

Nowhere is the need so pronounced as in Puerto Rico. Throughout the island, the loss of homes, infrastructure and loved ones has touched almost every resident. Many months later, thousands of people still lack electricity and running water. Your support is delivering the light of hope into the darkness of the disaster. From the aid and cleanup on the island, to support for presbyteries in Florida and New England as they receive many Puerto Ricans displaced by the devastation, to long-term rebuilding and development, your gifts have made the church's response possible. Because of your support, PDA is able to support a coordinator for relief and development efforts in Puerto Rico from the Puerto Rican Presbyterian community. This important step ensures that the work done by the church will be delivered efficiently and effectively and will build capacity should future disasters strike the U.S. territory.
