

Throughout the passport there are pictures to color and more information about some of the worship services and activities we participate in during the season of Lent.



†Lent Is Here!

Lenten practices 101

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the liturgical season of Lent. What is the purpose of Lent in the Reformed tradition? A basic guide to Lenten practices may be helpful.



Lent

The season of Lent leads up to the most holy of Christian days, Easter Sunday. The forty days of Lent begin Ash Wednesday and end at dusk the Saturday before Easter, **not** counting the Sundays in between. Many denominations encourage disciples to renew and strengthen their faith during Lent through the spiritual disciplines of prayer, Bible study, fasting, and service.

This preparation is a historical model from the early church. The idea of giving something up for Lent came out of this tradition, when fasting was used to raise one's spiritual consciousness and empty oneself before God. Fasting or giving up something for Lent can be a good way to explore a deeper expression of faith, if not adopted as a show of piety, martyrdom, or moral righteousness. Presbyterians may find it meaningful to give something up for Lent, but it is not required.

Some may find a more valuable spiritual exercise in taking something on during Lent—a more Christ-like attitude toward others, a humble spirit at work, or a feeling of gratitude in the midst of scarcity.

Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday, the entry point for Lenten preparation, is a service rich in ritual and symbolism. Palms waved at the previous year's Palm Sunday service are saved and burned to create ashes for the next Ash Wednesday. These are used by a minister or elder to mark participants' foreheads with the sign of the cross, saying the words, "You are dust,

and to dust you shall return," from Genesis 3:19." It is a reminder of our mortality and the hope of the resurrection.

Christians receive the sign of the cross to focus on who they are as human beings, bound in death and life to Christ. Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent provide time to explore the mystery at the heart of the gospel that being a Christian means a new life through Christ.

Maundy Thursday

The Thursday before Easter Sunday commemorates the *Last Supper of Jesus* with his disciples. The story of Jesus breaking and blessing bread at the Passover meal, as a reminder of his life given freely for all, is told in the books of Matthew, Mark, and Luke. This Passover act became the sacrament of holy communion in the Christian church. Celebration of communion is usually the centerpiece of a Maundy Thursday service.

Another, less celebrated, element of a Maundy Thursday service may be the act of foot washing. The observance of foot washing is practiced in some Presbyterian churches as a reminder of the kind of love and servanthood Christ asks of his disciples today.

Good Friday

The Friday before Easter marks the crucifixion and death of Jesus. Many wonder why this day is called good. This Friday is sometimes called Holy or Black Friday, but the term *good* reminds us of Jesus' blameless, good, and pious life. Many congregations base Good Friday worship on Jesus' last words from the cross.

Tenebrae

One other Lenten practice often observed during Holy Week is Tenebrae, Latin for "shadows" or "darkness," marked by the extinguishing of one candle after each reading until the room or sanctuary is totally dark. The darkness symbolizes the days Jesus spent in the tomb. This service can be held on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, or Holy Saturday.

Dorothy Eleanor Sanders Succumbs to Alzheimer's Disease

Former FPC member **Walter Sanders** let us know recently that his sister **Eleanor**, who also attended FPC for about eight years (2006-2014), has died. She passed away on Dec. 29, 2016.

The Reverend Dorothy Eleanor Sanders

July 31, 1932 - December 29, 2016

Dorothy Eleanor Sanders was born to Hugh Walter and Dorothy Newsom Sanders. The family resided in Forrest City, Ark., but she was born in Memphis, Tenn., the closest birthing hospital.

Eleanor, as she has been known her entire life, attended school in Forrest City and graduated as salutatorian of her class. She continued her education in Maryville College in Maryville, Tenn., until her family relocated to Austin, Tex.

There she enrolled in the University of Texas, and, graduated with a Degree in Education. Eleanor then pursed a Masters in Christian Education at the Union Presbyterian Seminary in Richmond, Va. After graduation she served Presbyterian churches as Director of Christian Education in Little Rock, Ark.; York, S.C.; Kilgore, Tex.; Lake Charles, La.; and Jonesboro, Ark..

After working about 20 years, Eleanor entered the Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary and successfully earned her third degree, a Masters of Divinity. She served in Anderson, Ind. and Charleston, S.C., then was called home to care for her mother. After her mother's death, she served in various positions in several churches in the Austin area needing help and also served as a hospice chaplain in the Texas Hill Country. Not being willing to completely retire, she took a position with the Internal Revenue Service. She also allowed herself to engage in one of her many loves,



traveling to all parts of the United States as well as the world. She enjoyed her journeys to Ireland, Scotland, France, Italy and Mexico. She traveled to China and taught English to students in their school system, and followed the Apostle Paul's journeys as he spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ and established churches in what is now Syria, Turkey and Greece.

A big part of Eleanor's teen years was spent as a camper and counselor at the Girl Scout camp at Texlake. Her love of Texlake became a tradition carried on in her name through the third generation of Sander's girls. She was a woman ahead of her time who decided on a career of Christian service when few women were welcomed and recognized for their leadership abilities. She traveled as a woman alone in areas of the world where independence and freedom were denied to women.

Eleanor loved the Hill Country and the Federated Church in Sunrise Beach, Texas, that her father helped to establish. She loved nature, being with her family, and her Lord Jesus Christ.

Eleanor recognized the beginning signs of Alzheimer's herself and chose to leave the Austin area in order to be close to family in Commerce, Texas. As the disease progressed she chose to move again as her family moved from Commerce, Texas, back to the Hill Country and the Windchime in Kingsland.

She leaves her brother, Walter Sanders and his wife Sharon, and numerous nieces and nephews who will always be in awe of her courage, determination, faith and love.

The family held a private burial with a memorial service at a later date. Those wishing to honor her may send memorials to the Sanders Family Scholarship Fund at the Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary or to the Federated Church of Sunrise Beach, TX.

•Sole Hope, new mission project: We are just beginning a new project called Sole Hope. For this mission activity we will cut out the parts for making simple shoes for children and adults who live in Uganda, AFRICA. The parts we cut out will then be sent to the location where they will be constructed. From there they are sent on to Uganda.

The aim of Sole Hope is to allow children and adults to live healthy lives and be free of foot-related diseases through education, jobs, and medical relief. Jiggers is a parasite (a sand flea) that enters the feet of children and adults who do not wear shoes. Having jiggers is painful and debilitating and is also a social stigma.

The Sole Hope shoes are made from denim material and parts of the sole of the shoe are made from plastic gallon jugs. PW will soon be asking for donations of old denim jeans and gallon plastic jugs.

However, please do not bring them to the church

<u>just yet!</u> We are planning a "Sole Hope" party soon at which time you may bring your old jeans and plastic jugs. There will be more news about this in the near future! In the meantime, to learn more about Sole Hope, check online at <u>solehope.org</u>.

FPC's **Bob Johnson** and **Lily Selvaggi** were also part of the Feb. 23 Journal issue. Bob commented about the planned community garden which is being revived at the First United Methodist Church.

Lily was featured prominently in the issue's *Rotary Corner*. She not only was a participant in the Rotary's annual writing contest interpreting its Four Way Test, she was declared the winner! The newspaper article said she will compete next at the district level.

Also making the news and deserving of a hearty congratulations is the **Northeast Hunt County Retired Teachers** organization. Its 120 members, gave almost 8,000 hours of volunteer service to the community in 2016. **Commerce Mayor Wyman Williams** recognized that effort with a city

proclamation naming the week of Feb. 19-25 as Northeast Hunt County Retired Teachers Week.

According to the proclamation, presented on Feb. 21, the group's donation of 7,681 volunteer hours was estimated to be the monetary equivalent of a \$78,610 donation to the city. The proclamation noted the group's members as living in Commerce, Cumby, and Wolf City, and listed the food pantry, the Bargain Box, the Children's Museum, Hunt County Regional Hospital, the Auxiliary, the Daughters of the American Revolution, Boys and Girls Club, the United Way, Commerce Library, and local churches as recipients of this public service.

They paid for repairs to lower the threshold and make an accident much less likely. New rubber was also added to keep water out. They have .also offered to pay part of the cost of a proposal to do a similar

FPC Treasurer's Report By Susan White

2016

Income for the entire year was \$129,411.31. This was 6.75% below the budget of \$138,779.00 for the year. Expenses for the 12 months were \$134,632.60. This was 2.99% below the budgeted expenses.

2016 expenses exceeded income by \$5,221.29. The shortfall was covered by existing funds in our checking account balance. We did a good job controlling most operating expenses. Also note that there were no special projects funded in 2016.

January

Our new budget for 2017 is \$140,747.00, or \$11,729 of operating expense per month. January receipts were \$22,833.92, including several members' annual donations in entirety. Expenses were \$10,462.45. This increased our bank balance by \$12,371.47 in January.
