You Shall Be Called Repairers of the Breach

The title above refers to this year's theme for **One Great Hour of Sharing**, which comes from **Isaiah 58, verse 12.** A breach is a break in something, usually with the connotation of coming on suddenly. These breaks are not good for the people they affect. The tornadoes that struck Alabama and surrounding states this month are a good example. They destroyed homes, property, and lives.

There are a lot of equally applicable examples of sudden breaches that you could probably come up with—hurricanes, fires, floods come to mind. Some breaches are definitely breaks, in that they disrupt and damage lives, but they are not always immediate or sudden—grinding poverty, devastating illness, wars.

We are blessed to have many resources to call upon to repair, or at least mitigate, any breaches that damage us. But what about others who lack such resources? Isaiah 58 issues a challenge—to help repair the breaches of others. Individually, our ability to reach out is limited. But one way we can reach out and help repair the breaches of others is to contribute to One Great Hour of Sharing.

One Great Hour of Sharing is a multi-denominational fund-raising effort that extends throughout the year. In the Presbyterian Church (USA), One Great Hour of Sharing is one of four church wide offerings each year. For most Presbyterian Churches, the timing of this offering is concentrated around Lent and Easter. It focuses on allowing the people of the church to come together to "share

God's love with our neighbors-in-need around the world" by providing disaster relief, food, and empowerment for the poor and oppressed."

Going the Extra Mile

She found a way to increase the acceptance of pumpkin and "Latin Rice," a nutritious staple often handed out in the field in emergency situations—by preparing and setting up tastings of these foods, complete with recipes and bags of ingredients at the Mar. 14 food pantry.

Food Pantry Donation Items

The Commerce Food Pantry typically serves between 30-40 different families in need each week—over 120 families each month. Donations remain an important source of its ability to help these people. Remember to help out the food pantry with a donation of food each Sunday.

Here are suggested donations. There is a box just inside the sanctuary for your donation.

1st Sunday—Instant Oatmeal

2nd Sunday—Ranch Style Beans

3rd Sunday—Spaghetti sauce (in cans)

4th Sunday—Chili without beans

5th Sunday—Canned pineapple

In addition to the above, the Commerce Food Pantry is always in need of grocery paper bags with handles (Braum's paper bags are perfect). If you have any spare paper bags, please consider donating them at any time.

A Lenten Devotional by Christopher M. Graham, Jr.

"For we ourselves were . . . passing our days in malice and envy, despicable, hating one another."

Such is our modus operandi, our standard operating procedure, our way of living in the world. In our fallen world, we do not come pre-programed with the way of love for other people. This place of malice is where we start and where we stand. Yet "according to his mercy" we need not stand, sit, or stay there. For the Spirit of God is poured out on the world through Jesus to enable our doing of good works. Speaking a bad word about our companions in the fellowship of humanity is at best stupid, Paul reminds us, while at worst such speech is a death-dealing false witness.

So let us work on this flaw. Not that anything we do merits the kindness of our savior, but let us act as the heirs we are—heirs who are productive even though our inheritance is assured. Let us learn the new way of our Lord and Master: the way of subjection, obedience, benediction, genteelness, tenderness, and consideration to the taking on of our full humanity in him until we know no other way than his.

PRAYER God the Father, God the Son, God the Holy Spirit, we acknowledge you as the one God who made humanity of one blood for your own inheritance. Might we be made good and kind to our fellow creatures, indeed to your whole creation, even as you have shown us goodness and kindness in the appearance of your Son. Have mercy upon us and forgive us according to your goodness and loving kindness. Renew us by your Spirit that we might be justified by your grace, leading us to the one hope of eternal life in your Son, our Savior, Jesus Christ.
